FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents

Mandela Day is commemorated annually on Nelson Mandela's birthday of 18 July. It is not only celebrated in South Africa but around the world and is inspired by a call Nelson Mandela made shortly before he died for the next generation to take on the burden of leadership in addressing the world's social injustices when he said that "it is in your hands now" It is a global movement to honour his life's work and to change the world for the better.

Nelson Mandela was imprisoned for 27 years of his life for his political views and his attempts to make South Africa a better place for all South Africans. He lost out on watching his children grow up; his mother died and he could not attend her funeral; the law firm that he established and built up collapsed; his wife was threatened, interrogated and assaulted whilst he could do nothing to protect her. One would think, on being released from prison in 1990, that he would have embarked on a campaign to seek revenge, retaliation and serve his own interests to get compensation for the almost three decades that he lost of his life.

However, when faced with a choice of conducting the rest of his life in his own interests or serving the interests of the greater majority of South Africans, he chose the latter. He said: "As I walked out the door toward the gate that would lead to my freedom, I knew if I didn't leave my bitterness and hatred behind, I'd still be in prison."

Nelson Mandela knew more than anyone else that there would be no easy walk to freedom. He would have to unite a divided people; fix a broken economy and deliver on his promises of undoing hundreds of years of inequality and also to win over the hearts of the pessimists who said that it could never be done – that this country was doomed to follow in the footsteps of other post-independent African countries that had promised so much but had failed. He could see a bigger picture for the collective good of all South Africans. He was not driven by any selfish ambitions.

This year's Mandela Day takes place under unique circumstances. Communities across the world are affected by the spread of Covid-19, which has hit every economy, causing new social and economic challenges and exacerbating old ones. The lockdown regulations that have taken hold this year have, possibly for the first time, given most of us a small sense of what is means to have our movement restricted and to experience discomfort. In order to halt the spread of this devastating pandemic, our President has imposed social distancing restrictions on all South Africans; implemented curfews and made the wearing of masks compulsory. It has meant missed birthday celebrations; postponement of weddings; cancellations of holidays and not being in the company of extended family and friends. It has been hard. Masks in particular are uncomfortable. But, these uncomfortable measures are necessary to protect every individual – rich and poor - from the devastating impact of this pandemic.

The reality is that we are not going to stop the Covid-19 pandemic if we are a nation of people only concerned with our individual interests. Of late, too many people are behaving recklessly with no 'bigger picture' implications for their individual behaviour and are not taking any responsibility for themselves with the coronavirus basics, such as wearing masks and undertaking social distancing. The wearing of masks helps to protect the wearer as well as those around them. The term social distancing means not inviting those outside the family with whom you live into your house; not organising or attending parties or social gatherings at other people's houses; not going away to holiday homes with anyone other than those with whom you live; not attending large gatherings of more than 50 people; not exercising in large groups without wearing masks. The lack of co-operation prompted our State President to impose further restrictions on South Africans' behaviour when he addressed the nation on the

evening of Sunday 12 July. It was a collective "telling off" for our general good. Unfortunately, in a pandemic, everybody is impacted by other people's bad choices.

Our return to school to school safety protocols have been specifically designed to isolate individual grades. Teachers have selflessly given up their specialist classrooms and teaching venues to travel to the students so as to restrict student movement thereby minimising the number of people that each student is exposed to. Our teachers generously sacrifice more of their personal time to arrive at school from 06:30 in order to undertake additional COVID-19 duties such as health screenings. The intention is to limit the potential for infection to spread. It is our fervent desire to make it possible for every student and every staff member to feel safe enough to return to school and not remain cocooned in their homes. However, our efforts come to naught without the continuation of safety protocols such as social distancing when leaving the relative safety of our campus. It requires the support of all Reddam House Umhlanga families to limit their contact with anyone else outside of their home.

To defeat COVID-19, will take a society made up of individuals who recognise that there is something beyond themselves; who have a sense of responsibility and restraint that guides their interaction with others at all times. We will need to conduct ourselves selflessly like Mandela did. It requires continued courage. It requires us to continue to sacrifice the liberties that we so desperately want back. Stopping the Coronavirus is the responsibility of all of us. It is not the time to be selfish or find short cuts. Yet, taking our example from Mandela, we can't let our bitterness imprison us. As Mandela said: "What counts in life is not the mere fact that we have lived. It is what difference we have made to the lives of others that will determine the significance of the life we lead."

GENERAL NEWS & INFORMATION

Staff News

Mr Phil Edmonds will be leaving Reddam House Umhlanga to take up a position at Reddam House Berkshire. Mr Edmonds' last day will be Friday 14 August. **Mr Ryan Smith** has been appointed as locum teacher of Business Studies from Monday 17 August until the end of the year. A Reddam House Umhlanga parent, Mr Smith holds a Bachelor of Business Administration degree. He managed his own printing business before deciding to study towards his teaching qualification. Mr Smith is also a freelance pyro technician, sound & lightning engineer and professional photographer.

We are in the process of confirming the replacements for the Grade 8 and 9 headships which we will announce in the next newsletter.

Daily Registration

Now that we are into our second week of Covid-19 protocols we are looking at ways in which we can streamline the process for our staff and students. One such way is that as of this week, we have removed the registration period first thing in the morning. The students report straight to their first lesson whether online or physically present and staff will record the absences in this lesson. A registration period is built into the timetable every Friday so that staff and students can still connect with each other in a more informal setting and catch up on the week that has gone and then plan for the week ahead.

Cycle Tests

A detailed letter pertaining to the new cycle test procedures and protocols was sent out earlier in the week to all parents and students. The biggest change is that those students who are online, must now ensure they log onto the Google Meet with two devices so that they can be seen throughout the assessment. The onset of loadshedding has further added to the complications of our hybrid model and we have therefore shifted the time of the bi-weekly cycle tests in order to be outside of our scheduled loadshedding times. As of Tuesday 21 July the cycle tests will be written from 12:30 to 13:30 (periods 9 and 10 on the timetable). The lessons that are scheduled to take place in lesson 9 and 10 will take place earlier in the day in periods 3 and 4(previously the cycle test period).

Loadshedding

The reintroduction of loadshedding has provided challenges as we navigate our way through the hybrid approach to lessons. We are currently in the process of investigating various solutions to ensure that loadshedding does not interrupt the delivery of virtual learning in particular. In the interim, teachers will upload the work to be covered during the course of the day in the specific Google Classroom. This will allow students at home to work on the allocated work should loadshedding at the College interrupt the live virtual lesson. Teachers will continue to record

their lessons and upload these recordings to Google Classroom should loadshedding impact on those students at home. They can watch these recorded lessons at a later time.

Hair & Uniform Expectations

This is an appeal to parents to assist us in ensuring that your son/daughter attends school appropriately attired. While students are wearing civvies from Monday to Thursday of each week, they are expected to be attired in a manner befitting a school environment. Strappy, low-cut tops, shorts that are excessively short or leggings that are revealing are simply not acceptable. Parents will be contacted from next week to bring a change of clothing for those students who elect not to cooperate in this regard. Students may not have obviously dyed hair and jewellery, other than the regulation jewellery that is permitted with the uniform. Girls' hair must be tied up if the length is such that it would touch the collar. Now that students are expected to wear their "step-out" uniforms on Fridays, we can no longer condone hair that is not in keeping with the code of conduct. Boys who have not yet had their hair cut need to do so as soon as possible.

A date for the resumption of the daily wearing of school uniform will be announced in due course. In the interim, parents are encouraged to inspect their child's uniforms to determine whether the items of clothing may need mending or replacing. The Uniform Shop has resumed business.

Term 3 Extramural Expectations

With Covid-19 regulations in place for the foreseeable future, our extramural activities will take place mainly through the 'In Da House' competitions. These sporting and cultural activities will be done through the use of our online platforms. Extramural challenges and activities are essential for student connection; mental and physical wellbeing and in keeping with our holistic educational ethos. Students will compete in their own spaces before submitting their results that will count towards the House Competition. Our students also have the opportunity to compete with other Reddam House schools in an inter-school virtual cross country challenge.

All students have signed up for at least two activities taking place this term. Depending on the activity, there are weekly sessions for students to attend so that they can work on their submissions or train for their events. Each event is compulsory and every student should submit or attend these. If they fail to do so they will be issued with a demerit. Hosted by NCUK (including a representative from the

University of Kent), attendees will gain further understanding of the UK and the opportunities available to students both during and after graduation. It will also be a chance to highlight the unique opportunity that students will have from January 2021 right here in South Africa as well as the evolving working opportunities they have after studying in the UK.

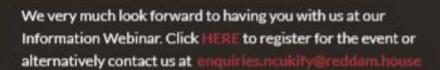

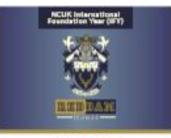

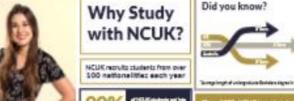

Grade 8 – 11 Global Competencies Day: Wednesday 29 July

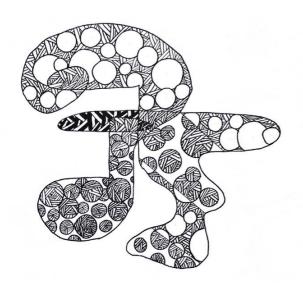
The Covid-19 pandemic has proven now more than ever that we need to be cognisant of preparing our students for an unknown future. The key competencies of creativity, critical thinking, communication and collaboration have been highlighted as the 21st century skills that teachers need to be incorporating into all of our syllabi. Although there are many instances of these and other essential skills that are a part of our curriculum, we are taking time out of the day on Wednesday 29 July to workshop activities and lessons that build these specific skills. Grade 8 and 9 students will work through these workshops from 10:00 to 12:00 and then Grade 10 and 11 students will have the workshops from 12:30 to 14:30. All workshops will take place in register classes and students will stay in their allocated zones and seating plans. Online students will be given a programme to follow at home. Normal lessons take place at all other times of the day.

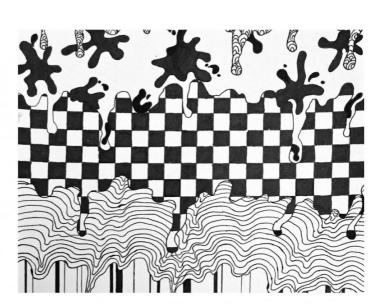
Grade 9 Subject Choice Evening: Thursday 30 July

Our annual Grade 9 Subject Choice Evening takes place on Thursday 30 July via the Zoom platform. Parents and Grade 9 students will be sent an invite electronically and will log on at 17:00 to hear an address from Mr Rogers and Mr Dekker, the psychologist who ran the educational assessments. Mrs Lourens will finish off the evening with an explanation of the decision process to follow. Teachers will load videos onto the Grade 9 Google platform which outlines their various subjects and students and parents are encouraged to watch these videos in order to gain insight into the course content from Grade 10 to 12.

Visual Art

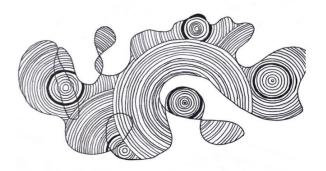

This book is designed to not only develop skill and technique in drawing, but to develop creativity and lateral thinking. It starts with doodling and each exercise gets progressively more challenging. The following examples are from the first exercise in the book: Doodling and Noodling. The doodling stage is different from the noodling stage. Doodling is typically free, loose, spontaneous, vigorous and fragmentary. The noodling stage is often controlled, patient, mechanical, repetitive and complete. But these neat categories have a way of spilling into each other.



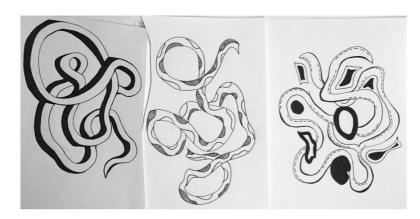


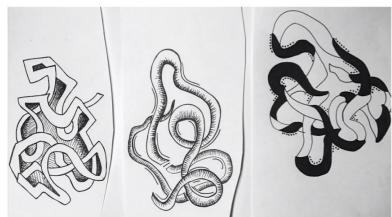

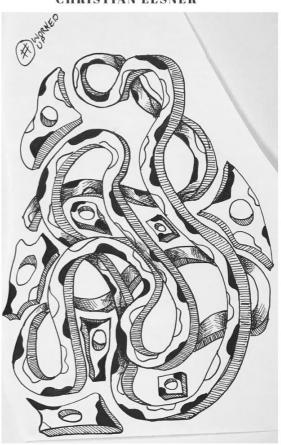
For the second exercise the students had to create variations of doodles that were of a similar type and then focus on developing one further than the rest.

WELLNESS INFORMATION

Physical Wellness

According to the Health Minister Dr Zweli Mkhize, South Africa has entered its peak in COVID-19 infections. Although we are still on level 3, South African are urged to stay indoors as much as possible and only go out for essentials. Many South Africans are isolating post a positive test, while some are quarantining at home post exposure to positive individuals. If there was ever a critical time for protecting ourselves and immune boosting, that time is now. Immune boosting aids in fighting off bacteria and viruses. There are a number of recommended vitamins namely Vitamin C, Vitamin D, Zinc and probiotics. Additional to supplements and nutrition is the need to exercise daily. Exercise may help combat the disease by boosting our immune systems and counteracting some of the co-morbidities like obesity, diabetes, hypertension, and serious heart conditions that make us more susceptible to severe COVID-19 illness. Please stay safe and healthy.

Emotional Wellness

It is important to acknowledge that whilst some may not be particularly worried about COVID-19, others may be terrified. Fluctuating anxiety; in keeping with the latest statistics and trends in the virus is also an absolutely normal response to these extraordinary circumstances.

With the recent return to school – all our students' experiences are likely to be completely unique and subjective. As much as from a practical front – the school can put all possible COVID policies and procedures in place – children and teenagers will ultimately be looking to their parents or guardians in terms of how to respond to the measures in place and for safety and reassurance.

It is so tough as a parent in the most uncertain of times to be a calm, reassuring voice to any worries your child may have. However, this is so very important to ease your child's anxiety about returning to school. Modelling and demonstrating that you are confident in the school's approach is so important to minimize any doubt and anxiety in your child. Start with an open conversation about how they are coping or feeling about returning to school. Keeping that door open is vital. Normalizing anxiety regarding returning to school is helpful and may take a few days or weeks for it to become another 'new normal'.
