FROM THE HEAD

Dear Parents

We have come to the end of an extremely successful yet challenging term. Our students have fully embraced the holistic education afforded them and it is with great pride that I reflect on our students' performance in the classroom, on the sports field and on the stage this term. I am extremely grateful to our students for wanting to be the best that they can be and for dedicating their diverse range of talents to representing their school in various events, fixtures and performances this term despite the requirements of an academic programme characterised by continuous assessment.

From analysing the Grade 8 to 12 mid-year examination results I have been amazed that most of our top academic performers are also our busiest students extramurally. These top academics can also be found singing in the choir, playing in our orchestra as well as competing at the highest levels in a range of sports. It seems to be true – a busy and productive student is a successful student. In talking to these top academic achievers have also attributed their success to sound study methods, regular revision of their class and homework, listening attentively in class and attending support lessons. I commend them for their all-round dedication and diligence.

I wish to also pay tribute to our Matric students who, despite the demands of their final academic year, have led the school by example by fulfilling their extramural responsibilities as well as engaging in various leadership initiatives this term. The recent "Glitter & Glow" Social was an entirely Grade 12 led and student-centered event that successfully showcased our College for what it is: a happy, positive and embracing place in which to be.

Despite having so many reasons to be proud of the students that attend our College, I am very disappointed to have to inform you of a series of set-backs that have had serious consequences for some of our students this term.

In order to provide a structured, fair and safe place for all of our students to learn and explore their talents, there must be a balance between a strict disciplinary system and an environment that is free and encouraging of individual expression. Consequently we work hard to implement the Reddam House Disciplinary Code that aims to ensure respect for students and teachers as well as high standards of behaviour by all of our students.

When, at the beginning of the term, we had suspicions that some of our boarders may have been involved in some illicit activities, a drug test was conducted on all of our boarders in accordance with paragraph 7.10 of our Disciplinary Code which states: "in the interests of safeguarding all students against possible drug possession and/ or mind-altering substance possession and/ or use, random searching and/ or testing on suspicion of possession and/ or use may be conducted by the Head of School or his delegated authority."

Two of our boarders tested positive. Both of these students admitted to consuming cannabis on the weekend under their parents' supervision. Consequently one of the students was externally suspended for a week in accordance with the highest sanction and the other, because she is in Grade 12, had her sanction commuted to two weeks internal suspension in order not to jeopardise her Matric results. Both were given a final warning. Both students were required to attend individual counselling with a psychologist who specialises in addiction to assist them in making better choices. All of our boarders attended a group counselling session facilitated by Careline to warn them of the dangers of recreational drug and alcohol use.

Following the "Glitter and Glow" Social on Friday 7 June it was brought to our attention that some of the Grade 12 students may have been under the influence of alcohol on arrival at the event or may have consumed alcohol at school on the night of the event. We embarked on a full and comprehensive investigation on the morning of Monday 10 June whereupon every Grade 12 student was given the opportunity to write a statement admitting their involvement or divulging what knowledge they had of the events on the evening. One Grade 12 student admitted his involvement immediately.

On cross checking the statements it was found that eight Grade 12 students had not fully disclosed their involvement. Following two further opportunities to tell the truth, they finally recanted their original statements and provided new statements where they admitted their involvement. At the conclusion of the investigation standard punishments were imposed on all nine Grade 12 students. Increasing numbers of Demerits were imposed on students who had either lied in their original statements; consumed alcohol or who had supplied and consumed alcohol.

However, once these standard punishments were then applied to the Grade 12 students' cumulative disciplinary records, the overall outcome became different. Consequently, of the nine students involved:

- Seven have had their one week external suspension commuted to two weeks internal suspension. All seven students are on a final warning.
- Six may not attend their Matric Dance on Friday 19 July.
- One of the students has been instructed to step down as Chairperson of her Grade 12 Leadership Portfolio.
- The Grade 12 student who was already on a final warning for the consumption of cannabis has been withdrawn and is no longer a Reddam House Umhlanga student.

The past week has been extremely grueling. Much hurt and disappointment is being felt by some of our Reddam House Umhlanga families and our management and staff have been left feeling quite gutted.

Teenagers make mistakes. They also deserve a second chance to right the wrong committed and make amends. As guardians of young adults we are expected to guide our charges to make the right choices. However, when this does not happen, they should always tell the truth and be prepared to face the consequences of their actions. We encourage parents to use these unfortunate examples in continuing such discussions at home.

This devastating series of events has served as a reminder that our students are constantly faced with complex choices and temptations. To further safeguard them, and to assist them in making informed choices, random drug testing will take place in our College next term, together with an intensive alcohol and drug awareness programme. Please draw this to your child's attention this holiday and take note of the company that he/ she keeps. It is our sincere hope that other students and their families do not get to experience the same consequences as these Grade 12 students.

I am extremely grateful to the parents of the Grade 12 students involved for the grace and dignity that they have shown despite their pain. All of them have supported the outcome of the investigative process. I further wish to assure all of our Reddam House Umhlanga parents that your child's best interests remain at the heart of all policies and decision making at Reddam House Umhlanga.

School reopens on Tuesday 16 July and College students are expected to commemorate the first academic school day by arriving in their full step-out uniforms. The first week of next term is a busy one as we commemorate Mandela Day on 18 July and we end this first week with the Matric Dance. Please consult the letter that was sent out at the end of last week, as well as the events calendar on the Reddam House Umhlanga app, for details of next term's activities so that you can plan your term around them.

My appreciation is extended to all College students and staff who have worked so hard this term. We wish our Reddam House Umhlanga families a wonderful July holiday. May you find the time to reconnect as a family and find rewarding ways to relax collectively and individually.



LO Island Day: Thursday 20 June






